**BILL BARTOS** - I think you all received a copy of the letter from Atty. Runkle for Huth Concrete, so, I just wanted to make sure that it was brought to everyone's attention that the appeal has been withdrawn of the Cease and Desist order. So, if there's any questions, I can take those now.

**COUNCILMAN LEWIS** – So, exactly what does that mean?

<u>BILL BARTOS</u> – The Cease and Desist orders are actually descended because the on-site crushing activity has ceased. So, it came to our attention that the Administration confirmed that that the on-site crushing activity has ceased and it was confirmed not only by the Building Dept., but also by Mr. Runkle himself that they ceased and they do not envision any additional crushing at this time also that the equipment that was used for the crushing has been removed by Beaver Excavating which was the subcontractor doing the crushing. So, those were two critical aspects that originally led to both orders.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT ISTNICK** – Anyone else? So they have removed the equipment and it's ceased and they will not continue at a later date?

<u>BILL BARTOS</u> – The understanding is that they do not anticipate any crushing at this time. So, if there is any crushing at a later date, that would lead to further enforcement. The current

order is related to the current crushing, the current use of the equipment; that had ceased, the equipment was moved, therefore, those orders were rescinded and then the appeal was subsequently withdrawn.

## **COUNCIL PRESIDENT ISTNICK** – Councilman Gregg.

**COUNCILMAN GREGG** – So does that mean that all the complaints that the neighbors had have been satisfied?

BILL BARTOS – Councilman Gregg, I can't speak to that as far as what the Building Dept. has experienced. I know that I received an e-mail late today that they haven't received any additional complaints from Mr. Johnson which he sent out earlier today. So, I would say that right now as it stands, the crushing has ceased, equipment is gone, no additional complaints. Should additional complaints come in, I'm sure that it will be dealt with appropriately by the Building Dept. and the Administration, I'm sure can address those. But I just wanted to address the legal aspects of the Cease and Desist since I was copied on the letter. Thank you.

Your best bet is to probably go with them; that's not a negotiation. A negotiation is a conversation back and forth. So, I just wanted to make sure that I highlighted that point in front of Council so that the record shows that this is not a negotiation; this is a rate increase that Aqua feels is fair and it is going forward.

# 17. REMARKS OF DELEGATIONS AND CITIZENS TO MATTERS <u>NOT</u> ON THE AGENDA

L.J. DELUCA – 2954 Veterans Blvd. S.E., Massillon, Ohio. Hello, Madam President, hello, Diane, hello everybody else here and my friends and residents of Massillon, Ohio. My e-mail is lideluca752@gmail.com and so far, in the last four weeks I've received 46 great responses. Now, that's Massillon, amazing. Not that I'm excited about it, but I am excited, but I just didn't expect that many in that short of time. I was flying the other day and I got back and I didn't know what a dead-heading pilot was. I was sitting next to a dead-heading pilot. But, anyhow, make a long story short, that's a pilot's repositioning for those of you that don't know, so he or she could be at the right place in his flight. I've never had that happen to me and I'm used to flying all around the country. I never held an elected office at all, my relatives all have, big jobs and district judges and mayors and so on and so forth, but I talked to a lot of leadership and this is the important thing here. Non-profit agencies in this town, I've dealt with them, we give a lot of food and money. I see Judge Elum a lot of times and a lot of good friends here to. I talked to the business leaders, some of the neighborhood leaders have their own people and you all know me; we've been talking for years. And more importantly, I've been listening to their challenges and one of them here, I even made a note of it, to ask the Mayor if we'll ever have a town hall meeting like my cousin used to have in Pittsburgh, PA. I hope we do, where the Mayor can answer these questions, even at our Massillon City Council meetings. I'd like to put it up to the Mayor, I know she can't answer that right now, but I'd like to see if we could have some town hall meetings where we can ask the Mayor something and get a straight answer and a transparent answer. I'd really appreciate that and I know a lot of people are calling me. Mayor Kathy Catazaro-Perry and Safety Service Director, Barb Sylvester, after our last Massillon City Council meeting and what we discussed there and the urgency of it, I fully

expected Mayor Kathy Catazaro-Perry and Massillon Safety Service Director, Barb Sylvester to put up temporary crossing signs at the walkway between Smiley's Restaurant, Sugar Bowl, Heck's Downtown and Sangria to get across the street there to go to Victorian Reflections, Bender's and The Root because I use that all day. I go down there all the time, maybe too much, some say, here Ted. But there's been so many close calls to death there on Lincoln Way in downtown Massillon. I thought you would get the big picture of safety. We had that meeting that was about a week ago. I believe we failed the citizens in some way. I've talked to Jason Popiel, we're going to get to it; I think we're on the right road to recovery. So, it's not just a run-down of anybody. But, I fully expected the Mayor, you took the notes and have to take care of the people of Augusta Lakes that got back with me. I know that Jason Popiel, our engineer, is taking care of it. I talked to other people too. The moths, mosquitoes, 150 trucks coming in; they're not little pebbles. Those are big things. I was over there; I drove over there. They're not going down the truck designated roads. What is this about? And according to our fine City Engineer, I talked to him tonight and he's been on the road and getting back with me. Thank you, Jason, I really appreciate that. You know what safety is. Jason Popiel, our City Engineer, as I said, by OHM Advisors, he said the resolutions are being finalized and Jason, thanks again for your extended phone calls and your help when the City of Massillon residents really need it. We're getting it resolved and I thank you for taking lead in the administration, Jason Popiel. We've got so many things; the pipes are not right at this pond. I fully expected the Mayor and the Safety Service Director to put up even more signs further down in the Augusta Lakes. I drive there all the time on Richville Dr. leading into Augusta Lakes and I know it's been about what, 18 years, 14 years? I talked to Steve Smith, I talked to a lot of people and we didn't have this problem until we had this new development and after the Parade of Homes. But even if they did, the Mayor and the Safety Service Director, they need to deal with it. They have the opportunity. Because Massillon City Council members and my residents are listening in, to fix it that night. We had a meeting August 9th, about a week ago. So, what went by was Tuesday, the 10<sup>th</sup>, Wednesday, the 11<sup>th</sup>, Thursday, the 12<sup>th</sup>, Friday, the 13<sup>th</sup>; nothing out. I don't expect the big signs, but I expected caution signs or something like that. Saturday, the 14<sup>th</sup>, nothing up there. I went down Sunday, the 15<sup>th</sup>. We're now at Monday, the 16th. Nothing has been done. I even called the Massillon Police Dept. and wanted to file a report that we can try to get somebody on. I called the Massillon Safety Service Director, Barb Sylvester's office four times. I got no response. I tried to call Charlie Hammertree. I know Charlie. Get back with me. Hammertree. He's the one that had something to do with this too. Not this; but years ago. But, our residents still have some horror stories to tell. We have death traps in downtown Massillon in our walkway that you heard everybody come up and say, including one of our own councilman, Jim Thieret's wife. It's like Jimmy; I want something done. I'm six foot, two inches, I even have it on my smartphone, these weeds; you can't see babies, cars, you can't see nothing. What is it? I talked to the Street Dept. people that are out there. I said I might get my weed wacker and I'm not making a joke about. Somebody's going to get killed there. We talked about the Streetscape III that we have coming up, if we can't take care of Streetscape I and II, how in the world are we going to take care of Streetscape III? So, they asked for more money on that. And then food trucks. I don't care if it's tacos. I don't care if it's pizza. I don't even care if it's other food. The City of Massillon, Lincoln Way, which is State Route 172, it's too small to have any food trucks on it. You can't see and finally, I talked to ODOT, which is Division IV and they handle the safety and the signs; I'm talking to Mr. Marsh. I'm going to call again if this isn't done. I'm going to call Barb Sylvester's office again, that'll be my fifth call and I'm going to work at this free handlely to get it done because safety is our number one priority and thank you, Madam President. The residents want safety too, first and foremost. Thank you.

**BARB BERGMEYER** – I live at 1017 – 1<sup>st</sup> St. N.E., Massillon, Ohio. At the last meeting, a gentleman presented a lot of talk about safety in the city and the need for enforcement of traffic laws and speeding. That has highly discussed and I agree 100%. My street links into Rt. 21 because of the way traffic is going, the speed on that. But I'd also like to talk about Lake and Rt. 21. I talked with Barb Sylvester about two years ago about the need of a "No Turn on Red" for people traveling North on Rt. 21. She said she would like to do a survey or some kind of thing that she had to see to see if it really warranted such a sign and the next thing I know, there's a sign up there. I called her and thanked her for it and it does say "No Turn on Red". That sign is not being enforced. They've even put a second one along the shoulder of the road and it's still being ignored by travelers. Now, if you're coming across Lake Ave. going East, the traffic light at Lake and Rt. 21 is a triggered light and the one at 1st is a timed light. So, there's times when traffic is coming off Rt. 21 turning onto Lake on their own green light, it pretty much almost fills up the one block in. When the light turns red for those going onto North Rt. 21, more often than not, those on Lake Ave. going West have a green arrow so that they can go South on Rt. 21. While they've got the green arrow, there's people that will turn right on red from Rt. 21 turning onto Lake. They fill up that one block space. When the light turns green for the other people that are going East on Lake and they have to cross over Rt. 21, they cannot go all the way because it's already filled up with traffic. So, there's times when there's people that are actually going across Rt. 21 and they have to stop on Rt. 21 because they're still waiting on the timed light at 1st and Lake to turn so that traffic can clear out and so, the people on Rt. 21 when you go North, when they get a green light, they can't go anywhere because people are still blocking. There's been times when I'm traveling North on Rt. 21, I get the red light there and I stop, I want to make a right hand turn onto Lake; there's people behind me. They're beeping their horns, they're flipping me off, they even pull around me, drive on the shoulder of the road and then they continue with a right hand turn as if they had a green arrow and not a red light. I would like to see traffic enforcement. Start ticketing some of those people there and if it gets to the point where the word is getting out that they are being ticketed, maybe it won't be so bad. But that's a really bad intersection and there's a lot of traffic accidents there and if something isn't done, there's going to be even more and possibly deaths. Thank you.

<u>COUNCIL PRESIDENT ISTNICK</u> – Thank you, ma'am. Anyone else like to address Council tonight?

SAM DAUT – I reside at 835 Cherry Rd. N.W., Massillon, Ohio. Before I get started, it wasn't on the agenda; I'm here tonight in regards to the remarks by Mr. Bartos. You do have a complaint in regards to the property in the rear of mine which is Huth Readi-Mix. Back in late February, early March, I filed a petition with the City of Massillon which was given to Mr. Bartos. I have here Cease and Desist when your Law Dept. failed to shut him down. He basically appealed, that Mr. Runkle, on two separate occasions which gave Mr. Huth an additional sixty days to continue hammer-jacking. I'm not as much upset, let me tell you, I'm not as much upset with Mr. Huth or Mr. Brosnahan, I should say, the owner of Huth, the present owner who took it upon himself to move into a residential neighborhood and literally create chaos within a two-square mile radius. If you had looked at the petition which this City should have acted on, your Law Director should have basically shut him down and failed to do that. These are your orders and your laws and if you're not going to enforce them and he's not going to enforce them, what he is allowed to do which is being a ready mix company. He's continuing to pile up; he says whether he does it or not. I don't want this to chance again.

First of all, I wake up every morning, in forty-six years, I was able to open my rear doors to my shop and at least get fresh air. He may not be hammer-jacking, but every morning I have to listen to that obnoxious sound of those trucks, those backup signals and I cannot even sit on my deck in the morning anymore because of the noise that continues to go on there. This isn't over and I would really appreciate either your Law Dept. or you, Mayor, could do something because as far as I'm concerned, somebody's circumventing laws here because this man should have not been allowed to continue. And to answer your question, you have more than one complaint, trust me. Look at that petition, because there are far more people on there that had to put up with this for six solid months. Thank you.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT ISTNICK** – Thank you. Anyone else? Councilman Lewis.

<u>COUNCILMAN LEWIS</u> – In accordance with Division (G)(3) of Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code, I move that we enter into Executive Session, to include all members of Council, the President of Council, the Clerk of Council, the Mayor, Director of Public Service and Safety, Law Director and Chief Council, Economic Development Director, for the purpose of conferencing with the Law Director and Chief Counsel to discuss pending court action involving the City of Massillon.

7 yes; 2 abstained to enter into Executive Session, Council President also abstained.

Entered into Executive Session – 7:10 p.m.

Exited out of Executive Session - 7:30 p.m.

**COUNCILMAN LEWIS** – I make a motion to exit Executive Session.

**COUNCIL PRESIDENT ISTNICK** – Seconded by Councilwoman Starrett. Roll call.

8 yes to exit Executive Session – Herncane had left the meeting

<u>COUNCIL PRESIDENT ISTNICK</u> – Thank you, Madam Clerk. We have exited Executive Session and back to our Regular Session.
